abette Health is forward-thinking and vital to their community. This past year, this rural hospital served 625 women and 220 babies. The OB-GYN floor has three large birthing rooms and three postpartum rooms. The hospital has added a surgery room on the floor as well. This addition was part of a \$24 million addition and remodel of the hospital.

Each year, the directors at **Labette Health Center** produce a capital list. Last year, they determined that the newly renovated OB floor needed another fetal heart monitor cart. According to Anthony Vaughan, **Labette Health Foundation** executive director, fetal monitoring units are a key component in a birthing unit as they support connection to a central documentation system and provide visual and audible indications of synchronous fetal or maternal heart rate and other vital signs. And such a cart could be moved quickly and easily throughout the OB-GYN floor.

The Rita J. Bicknell Women's Health Fund at CFSEK was asked to help purchase this through a grant in partnership with the
